Housing Insecurity HENDERSON and Homelessness





A LOOK AT SOUTHERN NEVADA



The most frequently cited cause of homelessness is the widening gap between income and cost of housing—a problem that is perpetuated by limited amounts of housing assistance. Other more specific factors, such as mental illness, chronic health conditions, substance abuse, and the debilitating effects of trauma also contribute to create a constellation of factors that are responsible for the presence of homelessness in the U.S.

2023 Point-in-Time count for Southern Nevada:


6,566 individuals were experiencing homelessness on Jan 25, 2023

Supportive Housing Offers Housing & Services



An estimated **\$40,000** per person per year is saved by housing chronically homeless individuals through mitigating ER visits, jail time, arrests and medical costs.*

WHAT IS HOMELESSNESS?

According to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), a person or family is considered homeless when they are:

- Living in a place not meant for human habitation, such as the street, a car, an encampment, a storm drain.
- Living in an emergency shelter.
- Living in a transitional housing program.

- Lost job or unemployment
- 2. Alcohol or drug abuse

Henderson addresses housing insecurity and homelessness through both prevention and response via multiple departments and in a variety of ways.

Regional Collaboration, Research and Advocacy

- Participates on the Southern Nevada Homelessness Continuum of Care (SNH CoC) Board and the Southern Nevada Regional Housing Authority Board.
- Advocates for resources in Henderson.

Housing Resources

- Partners with community non-profit organizations to provide rental assistance and other housing resources.
- Partners with affordable housing developers.

Emergency Response and Enforcement Activities

- Responds to complaints/violations of the Property Maintenance Code, such as litter, trash, etc.
- Responds to calls for people living in abandoned, substandard buildings or homeless encampments.
- · Enforces trespassing and park rules.
- Emergency response to medical, fire and other safety and healthrelated issues.

Supportive Services

- · Provides information on social services.
- Pilots a street outreach team to engage with people experiencing homelessness and connect them to resources.
- Provides meals for seniors and cooling/inclement weather stations.

\$31 million in CoC funds to local agencies to provide housing and supportive services to assist individuals experiencing homelessness across Clark County.

AT THE REGIONAL LEVEL

Homelessness in Clark County is addressed regionally through the Southern Nevada Homelessness Continuum of Care (SNH CoC). In accordance with HUD requirements, the SNH CoC Board is made up of representatives from various public and private agencies and organizations, as well as other stakeholders that benefit the mission of ending homelessness in Southern Nevada.

Addressing Homelessness Through Housing

To end homelessness, individuals must have the ability to obtain permanent housing that they are able to afford. Residents who are **housing cost burdened** are at risk of losing their homes should their income be adversely affected. **Housing cost burden disproportionately affects low-income families.**

32% of households are cost burdened

69% of those households earn \$50,000 or less a year.
