
Long Range Planning and Services at Work

Long Range Planning and Services Puts Real Programs to Work

- » INFRA GRANT AWARD FOR BOULDER HIGHWAY The City of Henderson was awarded \$39.9 Million in funding from the U.S. Department of Transportation's Infrastructure for Rebuilding America (INFRA) grant program. This funding will help implement the City's vision for Boulder Highway by enhancing automobile, bicycle, and pedestrian safety, lighting, and drainage throughout the corridor. The City sees this project as a key catalyst for the redevelopment of a corridor that has long been a priority for the City.
- » SNPLMA RD18 PTNA PROJECTS APPROVED FOR FUNDING Under the Southern Nevada Public Land Management Act (SNPLMA), revenues generated from the sales of public lands are used in part to fund parks, trails, and natural areas. The U.S. Department of the Interior approved funding of \$14,151,574 for the design and construction of Drake Street Park (\$3,876,394), Black Mountain Nature Preserve (\$5,608,540), and the Therapeutic Recreation and Inclusion Center (\$4,666,640).
- » REACH GRANT The City of Henderson has continued its partnership for a third consecutive year with the Southern Nevada Health District (SNHD) as a sub-recipient of the Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health (REACH) Grant in the amount of \$10,000. This is nationwide Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) program has the goal of reducing racial and ethnic health disparities. Year 3 of the Reach Grant (FY 2020-2021) focused on community outreach with food pantry operators and clients and stakeholder engagement. Results from outreach assisted the development of proposed standards for Community Food Services to be included in the Development Code.
- » USDA FARM TO SCHOOL GRANT The U.S. Department of Agriculture awarded \$88,218 to the City of Henderson to fund and create a hydroponic gardening system at four elementary schools including Robert Taylor, Gordon McCaw, Fay Galloway, and Marlan Walker. Schools were selected to participate in this program based on their proximity to Opportunity Zones in East Henderson as well as their need for increased access to healthy, local food. This grant will allow elementary students to participate in hands-on physical science and sustainability learning, food demonstrations, and student-operated farmer's markets in coordination with local nonprofit organization Green Our Planet.
